On Thursday 13th June Miss S M Jenkins received her OBE from HRH Queen Elizabeth at an investiture Ceremony held at Buckingham Palace.

Miss Jenkins was awarded an OBE (Officer of the Order of the British Empire) in the New Year's Honours List, in acknowledgement for her extraordinary services to education. Speaking after the ceremony, Miss Jenkins said, *"The trip to Buckingham Palace was amazing. My family and I had a fantastic time."*

Sue Jenkins is an exemplary leader who has worked tirelessly to get the best from everyone. Her selfless approach and commitment to both staff and students is an inspiration. She takes interest in every student, knowing and caring for them as individuals. She is a genuine role model for both staff and students in her tenacious approach to teaching and learning.

Sue Jenkins began her career at St Joseph's RC High School as Deputy Headteacher in January 1992 and became Headteacher in April 1997. During that time the school has become sector leading being awarded seven grade 1s in all of the Estyn key questions in spring 2007; a grading that was supported by the Section 50 inspection which looked at the Catholic life of the school. This outstanding endorsement was further supported in January 2013 when Estyn inspectors judged the school's overall current performance and its prospects for improvement to be 'Excellent' – the highest overall gradings a school can receive. Of the 15 judgements that are made in an inspection, St Joseph's RC High School achieved 15 'Excellent' gradings out of 15. These gradings were also supported in the Section 50 inspection which described the school as having a *"vibrant Catholic ethos [which] permeates every area of school life."* Mr Paul Bennett, Chair of Governors, said, *"Miss Jenkins is an inspirational Headteacher whose selfless inner drive has always been to do the very best for her students and the community she serves, and we are all very grateful to her."*

In January witnesses rang the police to report a shooting in the car park of the furniture store. The police deployed a rapid response unit including the forensic scientists from St Joseph's. They quickly secured the area and carried out a detailed examination of the crime scene. The forensic scientists carried out an extensive search of the area, they photographed key pieces of evidence, and collected and documented many vital clues at the scene of crime.

The forensics team were highly professional in their search, avoiding contamination at all points. They quickly established that a woman had been shot, and that she had a suspicious white substance concealed about her person.

One team of the forensic scientists carried out a series of experiments in their laboratories and established the identity of the victim. Blood, dental and fingerprint

against police and NHS records and showed the victim to be Olivia Naylor (aged 29).

Another team from the St Joseph's Forensics department examined blood samples, hair samples footprints from the suspect and established that the murderer was Greg Connors (aged 25). The forensic scientists worked with Police officers to confirm that the person detained was in deed the murderer. PC Colin Parker, a senior forensics officer with Gwent Constabulary stated that the quality of evidence that the St Joseph's team collected at the scene of crime is vital to ensure a conviction in these cases.

In a third investigation the forensics team determined the actual cause of death. Statements provided by the team for court based on their results suggested that the murderer was in fact attempting to buy drugs, which was the white powder concealed on the victim. Something went wrong during the deal resulting in a fight. The murderer was struck with a cricket bat by the victim. The murderer fell to the floor, pulled out a hand gun and fired once at the victim, causing the fatal wound. PC Amy Williams gave the St Joseph's forensics team guidance about how to present this evidence in a court of law. She stated that all evidence must show continuity to avoid it being thrown out of court.

The St Joseph's forensics team said that they were delighted with the outcome of this case. This was a particularly gruesome crime, and our evidence was key in putting the perpetrator behind bars.
