Ten reasons to celebrate our Careers Insight Day:

1 We hosted 16 national and local companies including our Valued Business Partners, Principality and Airbus.

2 Over 30 adults were present in school to share their company and wider knowledge with many of our pupils.

3 The context and success of our school was explained to all employers within an introductory session, this helped strengthen their understanding of our school and what they needed to present. Employers were very pleased to see the focus on our Catholic virtues and the development of the whole person.

4 Year 9 pupils had three presentations and lessons from three different companies which taught them about company structure and expectations. Employers were very impressed with the conduct of Year 9 and the questions they asked.

5 Some Year 8 forms were also involved in a pilot project with small group meetings in the hall. Their behaviour was exemplary and the employers commented on how much they enjoyed these conversations.

6 Employers emphasised the importance of school behaviour and attendance for future references which was a very valuable insight for our pupils.

7 Employers and pupils really focussed on the importance of the skills and knowledge taught in the Curriculum for Wales to support future employment.





8 Sixth Formers were treated to bespoke individual and small group sessions at lunch and in the afternoon. Several pupils have linked up to gain work experience and future support.

9 Year 10 pupils in the Employability Skills class met with employers in small groups to discuss skills and qualities required for employment.

Employers really valued this time with these pupils.

As a computer scientist, San Francisco is near the top of the list for places to visit and immerse yourself in our subject's history and its present day champions.







When I was offered the chance to experience this trip, a lifetime opportunity, it was all too easy to say yes.

Our first day started at three in the morning, where upon arriving at school it was all about bag weighing and saying goodbye for a week! Our flight lasted all of ten hours, on which we were fortunate to be on a fairly quiet flight. This was a good sign for the rest of the week – and what a week it was. We started with a trip to Silicon Valley, where we visited Google and Apple. The students were able to view the latest tech that both of the giants had to offer, and gave us all a prime opportunity for gift shopping.

We visited the Computer History Museum - amazing for both teachers and students. It was incredible to see the development of things such as games and technology we now take for granted. Some of the teachers (remaining nameless) were a little perturbed by the fact that toys of their childhood were also featured in a museum already!!!

Harry said "My favourite visit was the Computer History Museum. We learned so much about how computers have been developed over time. These museums worked hand in hand, we learned what makes up the processors that allow the computer to work."



Which leads us to the Intel Museum, which was a fascinating look into the full process behind designing the small chips that are the powerhouses within computers, from the earliest models Intel had to offer to what Moore's Law points to in the future. As a practioner, it was amazing to see real world examples that can now be applied in lessons and related to by learners following subject lessons!

When in San Francisco, it is a crime not to visit the Museum of Modern Art. In this part of the trip, learners were able to engage in a workshop that allowed them to explore the more artistic side of the city, demonstrating awareness and observations they have picked up from their Art lessons across the years. There were many different tasks on offer, some which were individual and let their learners focus on their own thoughts and some which were group based, allowing the learners to bounce ideas off of each other and discuss modern art in its' purest form.

We also did our fair share of sightseeing – Alcatraz and The Golden Gate Bridge are some of the most interesting landmarks on the east coast of America, allowing for many awesome photo opportunities and a chance for learners to discover some of the crazy history that San Francisco had to offer. Alcatraz was a favourite for many of us, the audio tour was fantastic.

This was a trip that our students will never forget – what an experience it was, the food, the culture, the tech and the ideas that it showed us all, made for an amazing experience of a lifetime. What are the Gwent Levels?

The Gwent Levels are an iconic, wetland landscape of international significance. It is home to an incredible diversity of wildlife of national importance which is as important to Wales for biodiversity as the Amazon rainforest is for the entire Earth. Isn't that amazing? The Gwent Levels are particularly rich in a stunning abundance of fascinating and rare aquatic invertebrates (watery bugs) and the Levels also support a wide variety of birds, particularly waders and waterfowl. A number of European and UK protected species have also been confirmed including some bat species, grass snake and of course the adorable water voles.

What threats are facing the Gwent Levels?

The Gwent Levels are unfortunately currently threatened by new solar developments as despite many sites being Special Sites of Scientific Interest (SSSIs). The Welsh planning system currently doesn't give enough special protections to protect this status. Solar developments are most definitely part of the solution to climate change but our Gwent Levels are incredibly important as both a carbon sink and a natural buffer to climate change's effects but also as a vital habitat for 10 key 'umbrella' species which help preserve and protect our natural ecosystems. We MUST remember that the Welsh Government jointlydeclared both a climate and nature emergency in 2021 as 17% of 3,902 species are at risk of extinction in Wales, with many others in decline. Therefore, we must stop these solar

developments from progressing and destroying these vital natural habitats for these 10 species:

- 1. Grayling Butterfly
- 2. Barn Owl
- 3. Dipper
- 4. Pine Marten
- 5. Pink Waxcap
- 6. Nightjar
- 7. Hedgehog
- 8. Adder
- 9. Shrill Carder Bee (Rarest Bumblebee in Britain)

10. Water Vole (think 'Ratty' from 'Wind in the Willows')

How are we involved in this campaign as a school community?

We are neighbours to the Gwent Levels and some parts of the Gwent Levels do enter Newport. As the parents and supporters of the next generation, we could have a powerful, positive influence on the Senedd if we make our voices clear and informed on this issue. Ultimately, the more support the



petition gets, the higher the chance of the Senedd considering this petition for a debate which could potentially lead to special planning protection on the Gwent Levels' SSSI sites as it deserves. For decades, Gwent Wildlife Trust has been working to restore, enhance and protect this important landscape for wildlife and people. The Gwent Levels need us all now.

Professor Dame Angela McLean, Chief Scientific Advisor for the Government, came to visit St Joseph's as part of her visit to South Wales. She was met by a welcoming committee which included Headteacher Mrs Jackie Jarrett, Year 12 and 13 computing students and the 2022/23 CyberGirls Wales competition Champions.

After giving a speech on the importance of upskilling and promoting STEM subjects to a capacity full hall of female students, Dame Angela was invited to a 'skills showcase', where students from year 9-13 demonstrated a range of computing skills from ethics in machine learning to writing programming projects and the creation of augmented reality apps. Students were also privileged to take part in a presentation by the Welsh Chief Scientific Adviser Professor Jas Pal Badyal on the influence of nature on modern engineering solutions.

Cybergirls Tournament

The annual CyberGirls competition took place in November, and St Joseph's was well represented! The CyberFirst Girls Competition is an annual event that aims to inspire Year 8 girls interested in technology to pursue a career in cyber security. This year saw 12,500 competitors, 3,600 teams and 750 schools from across the UK take part, St Joseph's competed against teams all across Wales. The top 10 teams from each region make it through to a regional finals competition.

In total, 58 girls from Year 8 signed up to compete in the competition, split across 16 teams and competition was fierce! Teams gain points from completing a range of problem solving challenges, ranging from completing Sudoku puzzles to decrypting hidden messages and editing backend website code! The lead changed hands on several occasions (often in a single day!), and it was impossible to call a winner until the very last day! Finally, it was the Reboot Rebels who came out as the top team in the school.

The team not only won the school competition, but came 6th in Wales and have qualified for the Welsh finals to be held in February. Alongside this achievement, the Reboot Rebels were ranked in the top 100 teams from across the whole of the UK, placing 69th overall!
