HISTORY:AUSCHWITZ

My trip to Auschwitz-Birkenau was simply life changing, and a surreal experience that I truly believe should be lived by everyone at least once.

It masterfully humanises the Holocaust, and gives a disturbing insight to how truly horrific the atrocities they suffered were. For me personally, the most sickening and daunting part was when we entered the the Auschwitz-Birkenau Memorial and Museum, and already felt the haunting vibe of the place, as it felt like I had just walked into a ghost town, but when I saw the mountainous belongings of the camps victims, such as old clothes, suitcases and belongings for their children, I was completely overwhelmed by the dreadful feeling I felt looking at these ghostly items, which all had their own story to tell.





I think the most shocking thing for me that I discovered whilst there was just the pure scale of it all, with the camp itself feeling as though it stretched on forever. My walk from the one side to the other took about 10 minutes in itself, whilst considering that we only stayed in the central area, with there being unending fields and ruins to the left and right of me that we didn't even explore. The museum also showed just how big of an event the Holocaust was, as they showed us the human hair and the pile of shoes, which I was initially expecting to not be much, with maybe a picture frame of hair and just a small pile of shoes, but my face dropped as I walked into a room with a full pile of braided human hair, spanning the entire length of the wall and going at least 6 ft back, and the shoes being roughly the same length, but on both walls in the room, leading to me being completely surrounded by old, disrepaired shoes, which felt almost as though I was surrounded by the ghosts of all the people who once wore those shoes, which shook me to my core.

There were enjoyable parts, however, with the final ceremony that we took part in, where we lit candles and left them there in order to show our respect to all the lives taken in that camp, as well as all those who were resilient enough to survive it all, which I found to be very heartwarming, and made me feel as though I had left a part of myself in the camp, which I found to be quite comforting. I also loved the little speech that our tour guide gave, which helped me to reflect massively on my entire life as a whole, with him pointing out the similarities that still exist today between back then and now, as in certain aspects, we haven't progressed much since the Holocaust at all, and he helped me to reflect on that and really think about it, which left a huge mark on me.

Overall, this was probably the best trip that I have ever been on, and has forever changed how I view the Holocaust, and has completely changed my outlook on life as a whole.

Year 7 also visited St Fagan's National Museum of History in Cardiff to discuss if there is more to Wales than just coal and daffodils and to discover more about our Welsh identity and heritage.

Rydyn ni wedi bod yn dysgu am arwyddocâd y Wladfa Gymraeg a sefydlwyd gan Lewis Jones yn 1865 a'r effaith mae'r Gymraeg yn dal i gael ym Mhatagonia hyd yma, fel Ysgol Gynradd Gymraeg a threfi Cymraeg sydd ag enwau Cymraeg o hyd fel Trelew, Dolafon, Trevelin a Phorth Madryn.

Mae disgyblion wedi bod yn edrych ar ddiwylliant y lleoedd yma a hefyd maen nhw wedi bod yn edrych ar eiriau Sbaeneg yn ogystal ag ymadroddion Cymraeg.Efallai, bydd yr adran Gymraeg yn trefnu taith ysgol arall i'r Ariannin gan fod y daith i Patagonia yn 2022 yn llawer o hwyl ac addysiadol.

Blwyddyn 8 / Year 8

Year 8 are currently learning about Patagonia and the journey that 150 Welsh speakers took from the port of Liverpool to Pueto Madryn in Patagonia on 28th July 1865.

We have been learning about the significance of the Welsh language colony that was set up by Lewis Jones in 1865 and the impact the Welsh language still has in Patagonia to date, such as a Welsh language primary school and towns which still have Welsh names such as Trelew, Dolafon, Trevelin and Porth Madryn.

Pupils have been looking at the culture of these places and have also been looking at Spanish words as well as Welsh phrases. Maybe the Welsh department will arrange another school trip to Argentina as the 2022 trip to Patagonia was lots of fun and very informative.

Each Welsh teacher has their own Duolingo code for their classes and every fortnight, pupils who have been working hard practising their Welsh skills have received a certificate and a treat, which have been designed by our hard working Cyngor Cymraeg.

During the Summer term, the Cyngor Cymraeg will be looking at different ways to reward form classes for working hard on improving their Welsh skills on Duolingo.

In March, four Year 9 boys represented St Joseph's in the national Cyber Explorers Cup Competition, hosted by CyberFirst. In preparation for the event, students needed to complete a series of tasks and challenges which would help them to prepare for the competition itself. Competing schools were given a specific competition slot, so after some last minute website unblocking, the four students: Nicolas, Nandor, Lamiek and Daniel were ready to represent the school and compete for the Cyber Cup!

The students worked at a frantic pace, with team leader Nicolas setting a blistering pace, demonstrating fantastic problem solving skills by solving puzzle after puzzle. For each puzzle solved, the students earned points for their team and within the hour long competition, all four students contributed to amassing an impressive 435 points out of a possible 500. The teamwork, effort and problem solving skills demonstrated while under the time pressure was impressive and all students represented the school impeccably.

Halt significant new development on the Gwent Levels SSSIs

The Gwent Levels is an ancient landscape, rich in culture and important for biodiversity, recreation, flood alleviation, carbon storage and food production. It is now facing multiple, adjacent, enormous solar proposals amongst other development proposals. The Welsh planning system in its present form is unable to control development, and the destruction which these will cause under present arrangements would mean the end of this beautiful, fragile and complex wetland.

Conclusion:

- We achieved our target of at least 100 signatures on the Senedd Petition which ended on the 25th of January with a total of 5,713 signatures so will be considered by the Senedd Petitions Committee. We hope this will turn out to be successful in obtaining special protections for the Gwent Levels so that GWT can focus on their conservation efforts only.
- Students throughout the school enjoyed learning about the Gwent Levels and positive awareness of this outstanding landscape has now been spread amongst the students, many of whom may have never visited them or heard of them before. We hope this will lead to students visiting the Gwent Levels reserves such as Magor Marsh or Newport Wetlands in the future and hopefully appreciate them and get involved in fun activities.
- Petra and Beccy from the Gwent Wildlife Trusts came in on Wednesday the 17th of January to present an assembly to Year 8 about GWT, their work and their campaign to raise awareness of and reduce pesticide use domestically (such as in pet flea treatment products). They were very respectful throughout and listened intently so we hope they have passed on the message about this to their friends and family around them.

• Overall, this has served as a good 'first-step' to introduce to our schools both GWT and the Gwent Levels and we hope to collaborate more with them later this year on school ground management projects.

Thank you to all parents, guardians, teachers and students who took the time to sign either of those petitions as we truly appreciate this small step to help protect the Gwent Levels, "Wales' equivalent of the Amazon rainforest" according to GWT.
