St Joseph's RC High School values pupil voice and we believe all of our pupils have the right to share their thoughts and feelings about their school life and learning environment. Our School Council aims to provide all pupils with a forum to express their opinion and make suggestions. Year, form, eco and charity reps have been elected by their peers to represent them and their school. They will be involved in work which aims to further enable our pupils to become; ambitious, capable learners; enterprising, creative contributors; ethical, informed citizens and healthy, confident individuals.

The School Council have already been busy meeting during SJHS 240 (approximately 240 pupil representatives) weeks. These weeks are scheduled throughout the year and provide an opportunity for representatives to meet, discuss, plan and work towards achieving the priorities set by the student body. The currently agreed priorities are:

- 1) Encouraging teachers to check understanding more often.
- 2) Delivering two IT lessons a fortnight for all year groups.
- 3) Completing more technology related tasks in lessons.
- 4) Setting up a buddy system for Year 7 pupils.
- 5) Investigating the root cause of bad behaviour.
- 6) Further developing a dedicated space to share ideas, worries, thoughts and feelings.
- 7) Completing charity walks to raise money for the school.

- 8) Investigating the feasibility of installing astro turf in the cage.
- 9) Further celebrating the achievements of all pupils
- 10) Investigating the potential of a more unisex PE uniform.
- 11) Investigating the importance of a uniform.

The School Council will produce a termly newsletter to inform the school community of their work and their progress towards achieving the agreed priorities. These will be published in the school newsletter. The aim is to progress each priority every half term and, when accomplished agree new priorities which will focus on pupils' education, wellbeing, community and equality.

Do remember to put any of your own suggestions or opinions into the suggestion box in reception and we will discuss them during our SJHS 240 weeks.

The day started with excitement in the air and our hearts being touched; the sacrifice of our heroes hadn't been forgotten. Upon arrival we were greeted by veterans of all sorts; those who served in the navy, airforce and army. One gentleman had even served during WWII. We were briefed on our visit and split into groups. Each group was then assigned to their initial task: to draw a collage for each DOD (Department of Defence). This was a fun and thought provoking task, encouraging us to envisage what the battle field was like for each branch of the forces. I took this as an opportunity to ask question and have a conversation with some of the men and women from

VC Gallery. They explained how you never forget any training when you leave the army, and how friendships are made forever. I learnt more about the WWII medals a gentleman was wearing; each had an amazing story and significance.

Our next lesson was on how the museum archive artefacts digitally. We used many war memorabilia brought in by the girls and completed a sheet on them. Each sheet had the owner's name, date and description. Then we had the opportunity to use a massive printer. To scan paper objects such as photographs and news papers. I also took part in photographing the objects and learning about the significance of capturing items through

picture.

We then studied a room full of artefacts from WWII. We were told that the museum has thousands of them, hidden away under the floors! They explained that space was limited but this is why it is important to constantly change the displays. We had great fun looking at the different objects and a favourite of mine was the fascinating piece of cloth embroidered with many soldiers' names and messages fro the nurses that worked during the war. The last part of the day was learning about the online Encyclopedia Britannica and how it is reliable for thousands of images and an abundance of information.

YOUNG PEOPLE'S Safeguarding Conference

The Gwent Safeguarding Children Board held their first young people's conference on Friday October 18 at the Celtic Manor Resort.

The conference themes had been chosen by young people and they were:

- mental health
- bullying
- knife crime

The themes were informed by an online consultation in May where 1668 young people voted on which safeguarding issues worried or concerned them the most.

The event was opened by Dr Sally Holland, the Children's Commissioner for Wales, who informed young people about their rights and their entitlements in Wales, and to have a say on matters that affect them.

The keynote speaker was Richard Parks, former Wales international rugby union player turned extreme endurance athlete and TV presenter. He shared his own experiences with mental health issues after injury ended his rugby career.

The young people attending the conference took part in anti-bullying workshops provided by Bullies Out and knife crime workshops provided by Fearless.

The day finished with the young people voting on which safeguarding issue they want the Gwent Safeguarding Board to prioritise this year.

Carpe Diem – 'Seize the Day!' Perhaps you've heard the phrase. Many people have, but few know the full quotation: 'Seize the day, trusting as little as possible in the future.'







MRC FESTIVAL OF MEDICAL RESEARCH





Cardiff University hosted 40 Year 10 pupils as part of the MRC Festival of Medical Research.

Pupils learnt about genetics, mental health and some of the research we do here at Cardiff University. In the morning, pupils took part in hands on sessions and games. Pupils learnt about genetics and extracted DNA from bananas with MAGES researchers Sarah and Naomi.

MAGES Lab Manager Lesley led tours of the Hadyn Ellis Building laboratories, giving pupils the chance to see the types of technology we use for our research. Pupils also played a variety of games to learn about neuronal stem cells, DNA, and how genes and the environment can increase or decrease risk for experiencing mental health disorders.

In the afternoon, pupils took part in group discussions on mental health. Facilitated by Cardiff University staff including MAGES researchers Naomi and Stephan, pupils discussed mental health in four themes:

- What things can affect your mental health?
- What support is available and what support would you want in an ideal world?
- What are your research priorities?
- What things promote good mental health and resilience?
