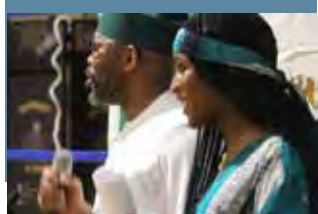

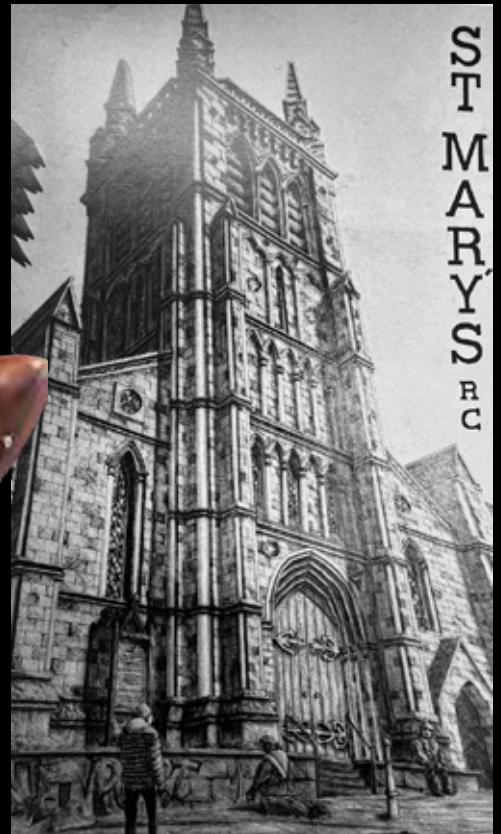

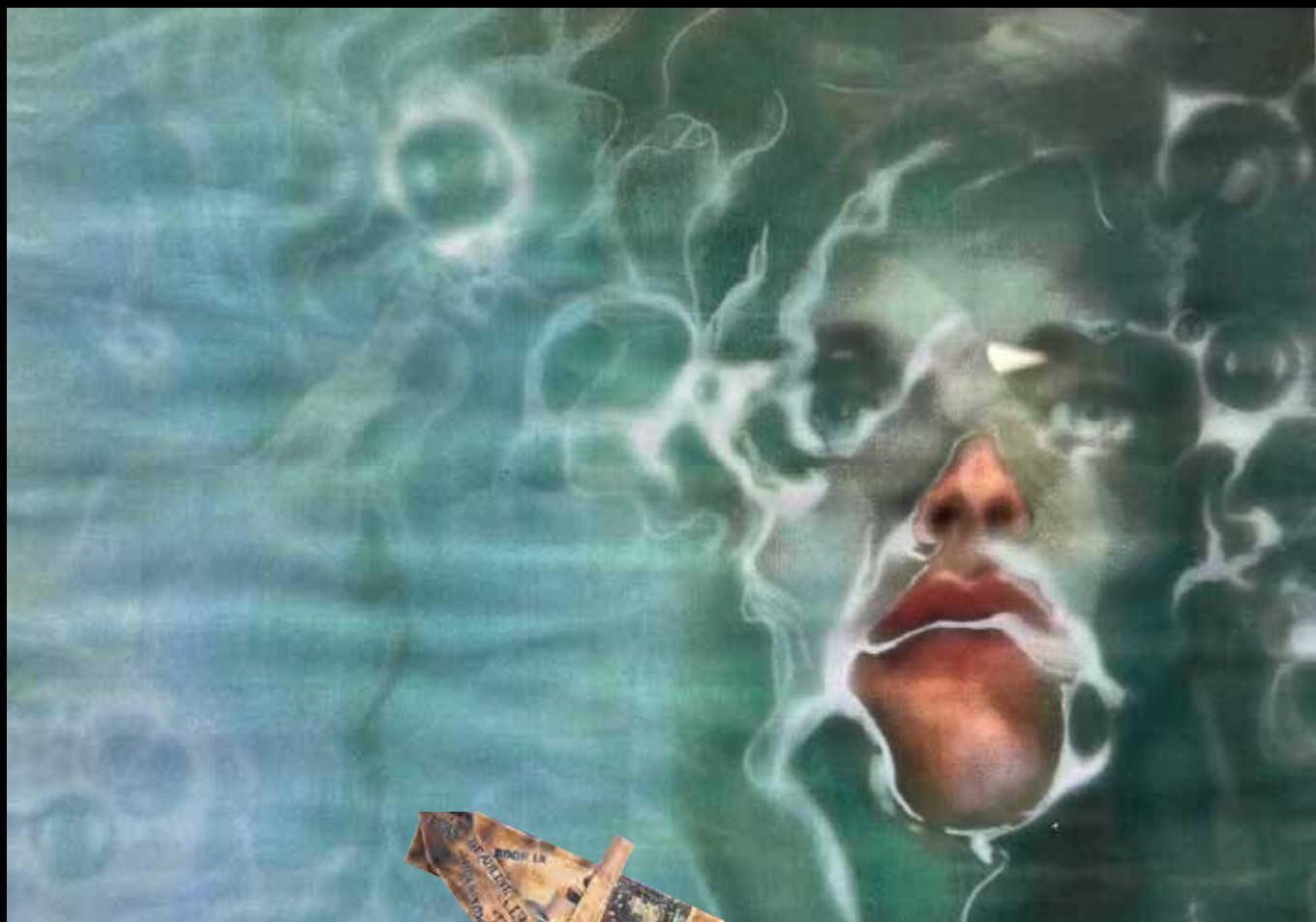

Year 10 Computer Science students recently took part in an exciting Cyber Investigations workshop, hosted by Rhys Driscoll from the University of South Wales (USW).

The visit was particularly special as Rhys is a former Head of Computing at St Joseph's, returning to the school to share his knowledge and experience with the next generation of Computer Science students.

Throughout the workshop, Rhys introduced students to a range of cyber investigation skills and techniques, giving them an insight into how digital information can be examined and used as part of an investigation.

Students then had the opportunity to put these new skills into practice through a range of practical activities and challenges. The tasks encouraged students to think logically, analyse information carefully and apply their problem-solving skills in realistic cyber investigation scenarios.

All Year 10 Computer Science students took part in the workshop and engaged brilliantly throughout the session. Feedback from the students was extremely positive, with students describing the workshop as "brilliant" and thoroughly enjoying the opportunity to develop their cyber skills in a practical and engaging way.

A huge thank you to Rhys Driscoll and the University of South Wales for providing such an enjoyable and valuable experience for our students. It was fantastic to welcome Rhys back to St Joseph's!

Year 9 Adventurers Workshop

Year 9 students recently had the opportunity to take part in an exciting CyberFirst Adventurers workshop, designed to introduce them to the world of computer science, cyber security and emerging technology.

The workshop gave students the chance to complete a range of fun and engaging problem-solving activities while also encouraging them to consider studying Computer Science at GCSE.

Throughout the session, students explored a variety of topics linked to the rapidly changing digital world. Activities included Open Source Intelligence (OSINT) style online investigations, where students used clues and publicly available information to solve challenges and uncover key information.

Students also investigated some of the latest trends in the development of technology, with a particular focus on the growing impact of Artificial Intelligence. This gave them an opportunity to consider how AI is changing the way we live and work, as well as some of the opportunities and challenges new technologies may create.

Another important area of the workshop focused on fake news and misinformation. Students explored different methods of spotting unreliable or misleading information online and considered the importance of questioning the content they see and share.

Our Year 9 students engaged brilliantly with the activities and demonstrated excellent problem-solving, investigation and critical-thinking skills throughout the workshop. The session provided a fantastic insight into the exciting opportunities available within computer science and cyber security and, hopefully, inspired many students to continue developing their digital skills in the future.

A huge thank you to CyberFirst for providing such an enjoyable and inspiring experiences for our students.

Year 8 Trailblazers Workshop

A selected group of Year 8 students recently had the opportunity to take part in an exciting CyberFirst workshop, developing their cyber security, problem-solving and analytical skills through a series of engaging challenges.

Throughout the workshop, students were tasked with completing a range of activities inspired by the skills used by cyber professionals. One challenge involved analysing data to create the ultimate Quidditch team, requiring students to carefully examine information and make evidence-based decisions.

Students also put their Open Source Intelligence (OSINT) skills to the test as they attempted to track down and locate the mysterious Patient Zero. By investigating clues and piecing together information, teams had to think carefully about how publicly available data can be used as part of a cyber investigation.

The final team challenge saw students working together to solve a series of problems and uncover the secret code to a safe. Communication, logical thinking and teamwork were essential as students raced to crack the code.

The Year 8 students engaged brilliantly with every activity, showing excellent teamwork, determination and enthusiasm throughout the day. They thoroughly enjoyed the experience and gained a valuable insight into the wide range of skills and careers associated with cyber security!

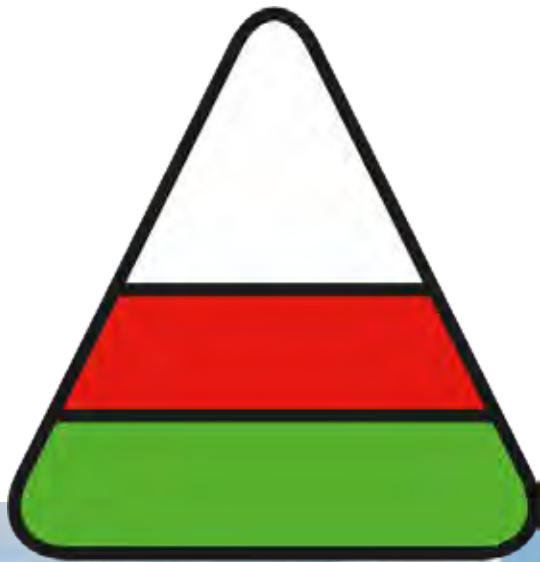

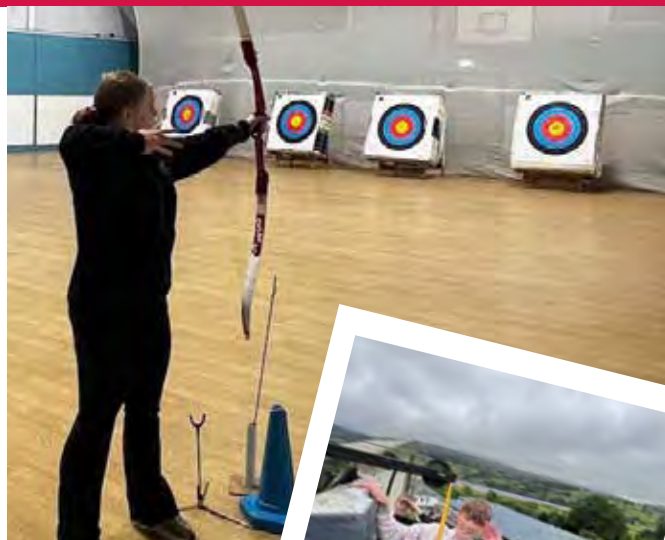

It was fantastic to see sustainability being promoted in a variety of subject areas, from the Art and Textiles departments, where materials are creatively reused and repurposed, to Geography lessons that explore important global issues such as rainforest destruction and deforestation.

Mr Nunn has worked hard to maintain a strong environmental focus throughout the year, regularly sharing information and evidence of the messages communicated to learners about environmental challenges and the actions they can take to make a positive difference. This ongoing engagement helps to ensure that sustainability remains a visible and important part of school life.

The Eco Committee members spoke enthusiastically about their projects and achievements. Their passion for improving the school environment was evident, and it was a pleasure to hear about the initiatives they have led and supported throughout the year.

Jo also gave the ECO Team lots to think about for next year, and gave them lots of hints and tips too.

Jo Walters, Keep Wales Tidy, thoroughly enjoyed the day with the ECO Team and said:

"Thank you for the warm welcome I received during my recent visit. It was a pleasure to speak with you, the staff, and the pupils; your collective enthusiasm for environmental action was inspiring."

It is clear that the school is fully committed to reducing its environmental impact. Significant investments, including the installation of solar panels, a heat pump, energy-efficient lighting and improvements to transport arrangements, demonstrate a genuine commitment to sustainability. These developments represent substantial progress and will make a meaningful contribution towards reducing the school's carbon emissions.

ECO THOUGHTS BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

International Day for Biological Diversity, celebrated each year on 22 May, is a global initiative led by the United Nations to highlight the importance of the rich variety of life on Earth. It reminds us that biodiversity underpins our daily lives, providing the food we eat, the air we breathe and the natural systems we rely on. It is also a call to recognise the growing threats facing the natural world and the urgent need to care for and protect it.

In the UK and Wales, biodiversity is declining due to habitat loss, pollution, climate change and human development. Many species and natural habitats are now in poor condition, with some at risk of disappearing altogether. These challenges have led to increasing concern about a “nature emergency” and highlight the importance of renewed efforts to protect and restore creation.

A local example often referenced is the decision not to proceed with the M4 relief road in 2019. While cost was a major factor, the potential damage to the Gwent Levels, an area of rich wildlife and protected habitats, was also significant, showing how development decisions can have lasting impacts on biodiversity.

There are simple ways we can all make a difference. At home we can support biodiversity by planting native flowers for pollinators, reducing the use of pesticides, creating wildlife-friendly spaces, and using water and resources wisely. Even small actions, such as allowing part of a garden to grow naturally or providing spaces for birds and insects, can help nurture and restore the natural world around us.

By taking small steps to protect the natural world, we can help preserve its beauty and richness for future generations.

Buzzing about Bees!

Using bricks and bits and bobs around the school, the Eco Team have created a bees and bugs house in the eco garden - it even has a roof!

Bee and bug houses are vital because they provide safe nesting and hibernation habitats for beneficial insects, combating urban habitat loss. By supporting species like solitary bees, ladybirds, and lacewings, these houses naturally boost plant pollination and provide organic pest control, which reduces the need for harmful chemical pesticides.

Celebrating Success and Looking Ahead

As we come to the end of another successful academic year, I would like to take the opportunity to reflect on the fantastic partnership between Careers Wales and St Joseph's RC High School and share some of the opportunities that have supported our students during 2025–26.

A major focus this year has been supporting our Year 11 students as they prepare for their next steps after compulsory education. Working closely with Mr Nunn and Mr Green, we are pleased that around 90% of Year 11 students have been offered a one-to-one guidance interview with a professionally trained Careers Wales adviser. These personalised sessions have provided students with the opportunity to explore their strengths, interests, qualifications and future aspirations, helping them make informed decisions about their post-16 pathways.

To further support career planning, Year 11 students participated in a range of activities designed to broaden their understanding of the options available to them. In November 2025, students attended a visit to Coleg Gwent, giving them a first-hand insight into college life, courses and facilities. In January 2026, we held a Sixth Form Information Evening, helping students and families understand the opportunities available through further study at St Joseph's.

This was followed by a Training Provider Briefing in May 2026, introducing students to apprenticeship and training opportunities. Together, these experiences have provided a valuable introduction to the many exciting pathways available after Year 11.

Students from other year groups have also benefited from Careers Wales activities this year. Victoria Burston-Yates, Careers Wales Business Engagement Adviser, organised engaging Health and Social Care workshops for Year 10 students in partnership with Flying Start, helping students understand careers within the sector. We also delivered a highly successful speed networking event to support Year 9 options choices, giving students the opportunity to speak directly with employers and learn about different industries. Throughout the year, a range of employers have visited the school to support learning linked to the Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs), helping students make meaningful connections between their education and the world of work.

Looking ahead to September, we are excited to continue building upon this year's success. Year 10 form groups have already received a Careers Wales introduction and have met their Careers Adviser, Lindsay Todd. One-to-one guidance interviews have already started, and students have taken part in group sessions introducing the full range of post-16 pathways, ensuring they are well prepared for the more detailed career discussions that will take place during guidance interviews.

Parents and carers play a vital role in supporting young people with career decisions. Please look out for our digital information letter, which explains how Careers Wales works and provides contact details for your Careers Adviser. This will be sent to Year 11 families in September and to Year 12 and 13 families in February.
