SCHOOL RENEWAL

Whilst you've been away...new Astroturf and lots of developments!

Whilst I'm sure we can all list many downsides to COVID 19 and the negative impact it has had on us as individuals, I am delighted to report that on a positive note, we have been extremely busy making improvements to our school site.

In previous editions of Insight, Mr Seghiri and I have reported on the hard work of the School Council in fundraising to deliver an Astroturf pitch in the caged area at the rear of school. We are delighted to report that during February, we had contractors on site and the new surface has now been laid and marked and the project completed ready for pupils to use on their return to school. We hope the pictures excite and invigorate our pupils and we very much look forward to seeing them using and enjoying it in the near future.

We have also taken the opportunity over lockdown to purchase and install more bench seating around the school site which pupils make significant use of at break and lunch times and replace the nets on each of our basketball courts. Another exciting development to brief pupils and parents/carers on is the new 15m x 15m canopy we have ordered for our central quad. This will provide a covered area for pupils to eat during inclement weather and covered protection during warm weather. It also provides an additional outside classroom. We anticipate this project will be finalised by Easter and we are sure this will we welcomed by our pupils and have a positive impact on their wellbeing.

Our two outdoor table tennis tables have now been repaired for use again and Mr Sankala and the PE department have also recently trialled our new air tumble track which will be used both for lessons, lunchtime gymnastics clubs and after school clubs.

We are grateful to our fantastic Mr Foster and the Site Team, Mr Mellon and Mr Whitehouse, who take great pride in our school building and have worked tirelessly over recent months making improvements around school and getting the site ready for a safe and enjoyable return to normal school life.

Ensuring Continued Home Learning Online (Laptops/Chromebooks)

You will be all too aware of the many challenges that parents/carers have faced in supporting their children with their education online over the past 12 months as a result of COVID 19. Whilst acknowledging the commitment of the Welsh Assembly Government and local education authorities in addressing a shortage of laptops and chrome books within educational institutions across Wales, we like many schools, have still faced a challenge due to the numbers required.

Last summer, the Newport Uskmouth Rotary project 'Laptops 4 Home Learning', started working with Newport Secondary Schools to help meet the needs of pupils who still required a laptop/chrome book for home use. Laptops 4 Home Learning donates, free of charge, new Chromebooks or refurbished laptops to schools for use by those pupils who do not have reliable access to a device at home.

The project has been supported through grant applications to Comic Relief, Newport City Homes and Virgin Media. This, together with funds from the Rotary Club and other small individual donations, has made 200+ laptops available to Newport Secondary Schools to date, with more being provided.

As a school community, we are extremely grateful to Richard Crowson and his colleagues involved in the Newport Uskmouth Rotary Project for their support, kindness and generosity and we would like to take this opportunity to thank you formally on behalf of those pupils who have benefited from the donation. Another group we must thank for a financial donation following a small grant application is the Ernest Cook Foundation Trust, who kindly provided funding for 10 new laptops, which have been loaned to pupils requiring them.

We continue to explore avenues on a daily basis to meet the needs of any new requests we receive from families for support / those who may still be experiencing challenges. - Replaced both S1 and S3 devices with 60 new laptops
- Provided KS5 with 33 wireless devices and a trolley located in G7
- Site survey and audit, Network infrastructure replaced
- Preliminary configuration of the new network ready for deployment in the first week of summer

Digital Technology & Computers Science

Over the past few months, the Digital Technology and Computer Science department has offered a variety of extracurricular opportunities to our students which has led to some great successes.

For the past two years St Joseph's RC High School has successfully entered the CyberFirst girl's competition which aims to get more girls interested in a career in cyber security. The CyberFirst Girls Competition provides a fun but challenging environment to inspire the next generation of young women to consider a career in cyber security. The CyberFirst girl's competition is organized and administered by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) an organization of the UK government.

Within each round of the competition there are several categories that cover different Computer Science and Cyber Security challenges to be completed. The content for each category of the competition is consistent with subjects within the English Computer Science syllabus from both the English National Curriculum and Scotland's Curriculum for Excellence. However, the competition will contain some advanced cyber topics that are not covered in traditional education but will seek to stretch the lateral thinking and additional cyber knowledge of the teams. Although we do not follow these curriculums, we have taken inspiration from them to develop our own which is engaging, challenging, and rewarding for all learners. The innovative, creative, and inspiring curriculum that we offer learners demonstrates our commitment to providing fantastic opportunities for all at St Joseph's.

NSCS CYBER FIRST SILVER AWARD





SCHOOL

We are extremely proud and excited to announce that St Joseph's RC High School has been recognized by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) an organization of the UK government as a CyberFirst School. We have achieved a Silver Award because we are delivering good standards of cyber security education.

For the past four years, we have been developing and refining our curriculum within the Digital Technology and Computer Science department with some fantastic opportunities being made for learners across all year groups. This has included robotics and programming sessions with Rewise Learning and the GFG Foundation, Computer Science master classes with Technocamps and offering learners the opportunity to visit Silicon Valley and Berlin to investigate and learn about new technologies and Computer Science.

Over the coming years, we will be working closely with a range of organizations to provide additional opportunities and learning experiences in the field of Cyber Security for all our community. I am particularly excited about how we will redesign our curriculum further ensuring challenge, aspiration and reward are embedded into our teaching and learning in the department.

This is a fabulous achievement to have gained, and we thank all our school community for supporting us on our technology journey. The National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) is giving students the opportunity to participate in short courses designed to introduce the younger generation to the world of cyber security. These courses are called Trailblazers, Adventurers, Defenders, Futures and Advanced.

Launched in May 2016, and inspired and led by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC), a part of GCHQ, CyberFirst is a programme of opportunities helping young people explore their passion for tech by introducing them to the world of cyber security. They are open to all sorts of tech and computing passions. Livestreamers with their own gaming vlogs.

Instagrammers who could find the perfect angle in their sleep. You really don't have to be fluent in Javascript to be the kind of mind we need. Each activity is designed to seek out people like you with potential, offering the support, skills, experience, and exposure you need to be the future first line of defence in our CyberFirst world.

All the courses are carefully designed to bring out every student's potential. Students will delve into how everyday technology really works; how the systems and software that surround us are connected to each other; how information flows through networks; and how we can take sensible steps to protect our digital world. Perhaps most importantly, everyone who does CyberFirst gains a strong sense of responsibility – to act safely, legally, and ethically. Integrity is an underpinning principle of everything that is taught and something that defines the cyber security profession.

As a CyberFirst School we will have the opportunity to book spaces for these courses ahead of everyone else. The courses on offer are:

• **Defenders**: A one week course for Year 10 students covering the securing of their personal devices.

• **Futures:** For Year 11 pupils, looking at cyber security for bigger networks.

• Advanced: For Year 12 pupils. Deep dives on four cyber specialisms.

These courses are first come, first served, with equal places for male/female attendees. Normally they are residential, often at a variety of UK Universities.

Each of these courses is free with all costs for accommodation, food, and drink being covered by CyberFirst. All you need to do is get there!

These opportunities will be available to book from the 7th April using a special link we will obtain from the NCSC. If you would be interested in booking this opportunity, then please email Mr Driscoll or complete the link here: https://tinyurl.com/38kxz763 A day in the life of a Sixth Former is something of a change to KS4 life. There are similarities – registration, lessons and break times all have the same timetable. However, as you will now only be studying a handful of subjects, the frequency of each subject lesson will increase.

One of the main differences is the fact that you will have free periods throughout the day which can be used as you wish, and you have the common room and study area where you can meet with friends or complete work. The kitchen in the common room is also a great asset. Most people start off the year socialising in their free periods, but then as exams start to approach, more and more students choose to use this time to finish off homework and revise. Depending on when your lessons are, there is also the option to use the library or IT rooms to complete work.

Ultimately, in the Sixth Form, there is a greater workload but more opportunity to become involved in the choices which are going to have a direct impact on your future, whether that is organising events for the year group, charity fundraisers, or arranging your own work placements. It's about increased independence with added responsibility, which is essentially training us for the next steps in our lives.

Being given the power of responsiblity for the entire year group put pressure onto each decision made. Although at times it has been stressful, it has been an invaluable experience as we have learnt a variety of key skills that not only add to our CV but are transferable into our careers.

Access to Bristol

The Access to Bristol course offers you the opportunity to experience a university environment whilst studying your chosen subject and meeting people who are considering studying that subject at university. From attending lectures once a week to completing mini assignments or research activities which are based on university modules, the course allowed me to make decisions regarding my future choices. On top of this, I also met people from all over the area who were both similar and different to me, and this exposed me to the sort of experiences I may have at university. Taking part in Access to Bristol for the 8 weeks also meant a contextual offer which made the entry requirements for University of Bristol slightly lower, and as it's one of my choices, this can only help. I would encourage you to apply at the start of Year 12 if this is something you may be considering, especially if you are uncertain about which course you may wish to study.

Cambridge Shadowing

I was given the opportunity to shadow an undergraduate student at the University of Cambridge for three days. The scheme is run for Year 12 pupils from state schools with very little experience of top university entries. Despite my previous concerns, I loved every second of the scheme. The mentors were extremely friendly and made me feel very welcome. I attended lectures with up to 500 people on chemistry as well as lab practicals on genetics.

There are 31 colleges in Cambridge and I stayed in Sidney Sussex. Within our colleges, we went on tours of the city and dined in grand halls. It was a great experience and I am very grateful for the opportunity. I was able to make new friends, learn more about Cambridge, such as the admissions process and have one on one tutorials with Cambridge professors. It showed me that if you work hard enough, regardless of your background, anyone can go to university. This trip has definitely inspired me to do well. I hope that more universities run schemes like this to inspire even more people from state schools to attend top universities and end the stigma surrounding them.

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TECHNOLOGY PROJECTS

Key Stage 3

Our students in Design and Technology have been motivated, engaged, and inspiring whilst they have been learning from home. Since Christmas, our Year 7, 8 and 9 students have been set a variety of different projects; one of these is the Chilly's project. This project required each student to carryout research into existing Chilly's bottles. Students created a Mood board with their own theme and shared a range of personalised designs with their teachers.

The final task required students to make their own model of their Chilly's bottle. Many of our students went above and beyond with their research, designing and modelling skills.

Year 10 Product Design:

Our Year 10 Product Design students were set a Mini NEA Contextual Cadbury's challenge. This involved a range of skills that is in preparation for their GCSE NEA that they will begin in June. **Students were given the following context and brief:**

CONTEXT: Cadbury's would like to promote a range of chocolate bars throughout popular stores in Wales.

DESIGN BRIEF: You are required to promote a Cadbury's product by designing an attractive and unique Point of sale display. The display must be attractive to the consumer and promote a product designed by Cadbury's. Your task is to create a portfolio of work to present your ideas to Cadbury.

Students produced work that was of high quality and portrayed a variety of skills such as researching the clients' needs, product analysis of existing Point of Sale displays, designing, problem solving, net developments and model making skills.

Ethan Doherty took this challenge to another level and produced amazing outcomes. Ethan chose to create a Pointof-Sale display that would promote a Freddo Chocolate bar. He carried out each research page with ease. Ethan produced a floor standing display that had buckets to display his Fredo chocolate bars- how amazing, doesn't it look eye catching! Well done, Ethan.
