### CYNEFIN PAMOJA

#### We are delighted to strengthen our anti-racist practice by now working in conjunction with Cynefin Pamoja.

Cynefin Pamoja (Belonging Together) is a vibrant community group for African and Caribbean people - a hub for cultural exchange, an advocate for environmental sustainability, and a nurturing space for youth development. They also focus on enhancing employability and education, empowering individuals with skills and opportunities to thrive in their personal and professional lives. Nkechi and Billy visited us and led a discussion and presentation with pupils from our Community Ministry.

#### We were delighted with their feedback about St Joesph's:

**The group dynamics:** Very cohesive, diverse and a strong sense of community amongst different year groups.

**Anti-bullying pupil policy ratification**: Proactive ratification. The inclusion of pupils is encouraging and shows that the policy incorporates those it will impact. **Diversity in the Curriculum pupil review**: Measured implementation of progressive radicalism. The adoption of 365 celebrations instead of one-off awareness celebrations is welcomed.

**Cultural celebration evenings**: Very innovative way to include parents and community members into diversity initiatives.

**Ethos felt**: Primarily a strong sense of belonging and community. Everyone is on board and pupils are aware of why things are in place. It is definitely clear that pupils are retaining what is being taught.



# Easter Message

### The resurrection of Jesus is like the quiet dawning of a new day heralding the defeat of the night.

"Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!"

John 20:18

Our Saviour meets us personally and intimately at unexpected times and places. When we meet Him, our grief and doubt are overcome. We are flooded with joy and peace as we move from sight to faith.

Jesus' resurrection is about God loving us so much that He is willing to go to any length to find us in all the wrong places. We go looking for God in the familiar, in the places where we expect to find God. In Jesus' resurrection God finds us when we are down and out and when we have lost hope. Students explored Times Square, strolled through Central Park, and enjoyed the electric atmosphere of an NBA basketball game as the Brooklyn Nets took on the Oklahoma City Thunder – a definite highlight for many.

A standout moment of the trip was the Harlem Civil Rights Tour, where pupils walked in the footsteps of influential leaders and learned about the pivotal role Harlem played in the fight for equality and justice. This powerful experience brought to life key themes from History offering students a deeper understanding of America's Civil Rights movement.

The itinerary also included visits to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island, where pupils explored stories of immigration and identity, linking perfectly with our GCSE and A Level courses. A guided tour of the United Nations Headquarters further broadened students' global awareness and sparked thoughtful conversations about international relations and diplomacy.

Throughout the trip, students represented the school with maturity and enthusiasm. Their behaviour was exemplary, and the staff were immensely proud of how they represented the school. #### Gweinidogaeth dros y Gymraeg



#### In a recent pupil voice survey, the student body agreed that we should aim to achieve the Bronze Campus Award. So in response we have begun to investigate and implement the necessary changes to achieve this award.

For example, we have increased Welsh signage around school including our digital signage around the campus. This means Welsh translations are more prevalent around the school encouraging students and staff to use Welsh more frequently.

The Welsh Ministry is also planning an assembly in school about the benefits of learning Welsh, highlighting how it can help job applications because it demonstrates students can interact and communicate successfully with a wider audience.

Finally, we have also discussed and made posters about different Welsh heroes to be put up in each classroom. For instance, in Music, we might do Tom Jones and a little segment about who he is and what he has done as a singer in hopes to further educate pupils about different Welsh figures.

We are always open to more ideas and suggestions concerning how to promote Wales and the Welsh language in school.

### SCHOOL COUNCIL YOUR VOICE, YOUR CHOICE

#### **Ministry for Curriculum**



#### Over the course of the last term the Ministry of Curriculum has been acting on our priorities.

We have fed back to Heads of Year, to ask that when pupils are consulted on issues for school life through pupil voice, the questions allow us to give anonymous responses on a google form. We also asked that they avoid using a 1–10 scale option, as no-one realistically gives a 1 or a 10 in these answers.

The Ministry also asked that more detail was provided to pupils in Year 9 who were making their option choices. This resulted in greater emphasis on assessment methods for the new GCSEs in the prospectus, and during subject presentations on the pathways evening. Teachers also recorded new loom videos for all subjects so that even if Year 9 pupils missed a presentation, they were able to find out about a subject online, rather than missing out on the information.

Next term, we plan to compile a list of potential experiences pupils should have before they leave school, and to explore how careers education is covered in learning plans of some departments.

Year 11 were able to listen to each of the Welsh personalities story of how the Welsh language has had an impact on their life as well as using the Welsh language to mix music in Welsh and introduce their own radio link to journalism skills and the importance of using effective and eye-catching language as a headline.

The morning was very successful and lots of Welsh was heard and spoken by the students.

The dinner was delicious and other girls were receiving awards in between courses. We were also able to speak to the women on our table and find out about their experiences and get advice for getting into cyber.
